As an artist, I have trained and toured with world renowned dance/drama/opera/ballet companies for more than two decades. As an educator, I have taught students from kindergarten to post-graduate levels. As a researcher, I have had the privilege of contributing research to an array of conferences and publications. I have also been given grants/scholarships from the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, American Dance Festival, Hong Kong HSBC Bank Foundation, York University, the Toronto Arts Council, and Canada Council for the Arts. In recent years, I have been invited to give talks, presentations, and workshops at Taipei National University of the Arts, Chinese Culture University, York University, University of Wisconsin - Madison, the University of Toronto, the Ontario Ministry of Education, to list a few. Many of my workshops are embodied, which means that participants are invited to explore and make connections with what they have known, heard, read, and experienced through

It would be a virtual event (everything would be submitted, shared, blind-reviewed, and rewarded online). Although being the Chair of Education Network of the World Dance Alliance is my no-pay on-the-side job, it is one of the most fulfilling tasks that I have been given.


